### Course Description

The first part of this course deals with the understanding of molecular dynamics and its correlation with molecular kinetics whether it is observed outside (physical properties) or inside the human body (pharmacokinetics) as well as how to correlate those observations with molecular structure. Therefore, it covers structural properties like lipophilicity, acidity, intermolecular interactions respectively. The second part of the course deals with the biotransformation reactions of drug molecular structure in the human body (drug metabolism reactions). The third part includes applications of the previously discussed principles on drugs affecting cholinergic and adrenergic receptors. Accordingly, intermolecular interactions, mechanism of action, a switching receptor (agonists) or off (antagonistic), and structure-activity relationships are also discussed.
